A new dawn for the Nigeria women

History played a fast one recently as members of the House of Representatives, for the first time in the political history of Nigeria, picked a female lawmaker to preside over their affairs. The favoured lawmaker is no other person than Mrs. Patricia Olubunmi Etteh. Since she emerged as speaker of the Lower Chamber, the question some political observers are asking is whether a woman would be able to hold the House, known for its volatility. Those who played key roles in the emergence of the new House leadership are quick to point out that she has all it takes to lead the chamber given her political pedigree.

The Amazon Patricia Etteh was born on August 17, 1953 at Ikire, Osun State; Etteh holds a diploma in law from the University of Abuja. She attended some academic programs both in the United Kingdom and United States of America. She served as lawmaker on the platform of the AD during the period 1999 to 2002 before she decamped to the ruling Peoples Democratic Party (PDP). Etteh was re-elected in 2003 and she became the deputy chief whip, a position she held until recently when the second dispensation of the Fourth Republic National Assembly was dissolved. She is said to be very experienced and intelligent.

Patricia is married to Etteh Etteh, an architect; the new Speaker was the leader of the South-West caucus in the House of Representatives in the last dispensation. She also served as chairperson of the female parliamentarians in the National Assembly. In the just concluded April 2007 elections, she was re-elected by her Ayedaade/Isokan/Irewole Federal Constituency.

Again Titi emerges Speaker of Ogun Assembly

The first female Speaker in the SouthWest and of Ogun State House of Assembly Mrs. Titi-Sodunke Oseni made history again when her male colleagues returned her as their Speaker. She would continue her prayer that other female Speakers will emerge to join her. Although she was not sure if she would be among the ranks of Speakers, she knew that she would return to the House of Assembly in 2007. "I plan to return. People from my constituency are saying that I should come

back to represent them as a member," she said before the April 2007 election.

Supreme Court sacks Uba returns Obi

The Supreme Court in a judgment has ordered the just sworn in Anambra State Governor, Chief Andy Uba to leave office with immediate effect and reinstated Mr. Peter Obi until 2010. the judgment was a unanimous decision by a seven panel of justices presided over by Justice Iyorgher Katsina-Alu, which held that the tenure of Mr. Peter Obi on the platform of the All Peoples Grand Alliance was not yet over. The court also blamed the Independent National Electoral Commission for going ahead with elections in Anambra State when the governor's tenure had not expired.

Meanwhile, President Yar'Adua has directed the Solicitor General of the Federation and Inspector General of Police to ensure the smooth transition back to Peter Obi as soon as they served with the court papers.

Dokunbo Asari free on bail

The leader of the Niger Delta People's Volunteer Force Mujahideen Asari Dokunbo walked free from the police Force Headquarters, vowing he would not give up violence. He said he would not do anything criminal or harmful to the environment, but that he would not give up the fight for the people of the Niger Delta. Asari was granted bail on health grounds.

The Ijaw freedom fighter, Alhaji Mujahid Abubakar Dokubo- Asari, has launched a blistering attack on the anti-corruption campaign of the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC), accusing the agency of selective operation. He also gave an indication that he would drag former President Olusegun Obasanjo to court to account for money the country earned in eight years.

Nigerian unions call off general strike

The Nigeria unions comprising of the Nigeria Labour Congress (NLC) and the Trade Union Congress (TUC) called off a four day old general strike which almost crippled the nation on Saturday, June 23, 2007 after the government agreed to a reduction in the price of petroleum product, removal of the 5% increase in VAT and to freeze fuel prices for a year, both sides said in a statement.

The strike shut down most sectors, including government offices, banks, ports, airlines and big businesses. However, oil shipments were maintained because Western companies replaced key union staff with management.

Yar'Adua declares N945.4m assets

President Umaru Yar'Adua has publicly declared his personal assets after about four weeks in office. He is the first public officer and President of Nigeria to make his assets public. Records indicate that he had consistently released his assets to the public since his election as a governor in 1999.

A copy of Yar'Adua's Assets Declaration Form made available in Abuja showed that his total assets, including the value of his shares in two banks and an hotel, are worth N945,446,162. A breakdown of the assets shows that he has N132,396,162.21 in Bank PHB and Unity Bank, the cash in the President's hand is N7,500,000. The value of his property in Katsina, Abuja and Kaduna is N527m. His undeveloped plots of land and farms are valued at N75m.

The form also indicates that the former governor of Katsina State owned vehicles whose total value is N181.550m, while his household furniture is worth N3m. He owns 2.2m shares in Bank PHB, Unity Bank Plc, and Muradi Hotels Limited.

His wife's properties, comprising three 'local houses,' a twin bungalow and three vacant plots are valued at N19m. The President has no foreign account. As a governor of a state, he was barred by the constitution from owning an account outside the country.

Ehindero under investigation, FG orders him to vacate IG's residence

Mr. Sunday Ehindero the former Inspector General of the Nigeria Police is being investigated over a multi-million naira scam at the Force Headquarters in Abuja. The investigators were said to have arrested an Assistant Commissioner of Police, identified as Jelili Ogundeyi, a pay officer who was accused of moving about N354 million for his boss. He was arrested in Lagos and kept in detention in Abuja.

Meanwhile, efforts by the former Inspector-General of Police, Mr. Sunday Gabriel Ehindero to retain the official quarters of the IGP, which he bought while still in service, suffered a major setback recently, as the Federal Government has ordered him to pack out of

the residence with immediate effect. The house at the Maitama area of Abuja was said to have been sold to Ehindero for about N120 million and the former police boss was said to have built additional structure with swimming pool inside the premises that reportedly has security gadgets worth over N20 million.

Iwu Directs INEC Officials to Cooperate with Tribunals

Apparently worried that staff of the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) are frustrating efforts of the election tribunals, the Chairman of the commission, Prof. Maurice Iwu, has again directed staff to assist and cooperate with all election tribunals.

He said this while speaking at the opening ceremony of a two-day workshop organized for public Affairs officers of the commission nationwide, Iwu reminded INEC staff that the election petition tribunals were part of the nation's electoral system and that as such they should be assisted to do a proper job.

Groups Protest against Ex-Gov Nnamani

The Economic and Financial Crime Commission (EFCC) has reemphasized its position that the former Governor of Enugu State, Dr. Chimaroke Nnamani and other former governors indicted for corrupt practices while in office have not been left off the hook of the Commission on the basis of plea-bargain which the agency recently had with the ex-governors.

Members of the civil society groups includes Civil Liberties Organization (CLO), Tropical Watch, Concerned Mothers of Enugu, Women in Nigeria, Enugu Youth Movement, Movement for Democracy and Good Governance, Coalition Against Corruption and Abuse of Due Process. In a petition to the EFCC, the groups said that it appears that the EFCC has left Nnamani and other governors to go free on the basis of the plea-bargain, a development which they described as a bad precedence in the war against corruption in the country.

EFCC officials in Jigawa

Barely two months into Lamido's assumption of office, officials of the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC), showed an appearance in Jigawa state, demanding for records of financial transactions of the last administration of former Governor

SaminuTuraki.

Information revealed that the arrival of the (EFCC) officials might not be unconnected with the recent crises over missing money belonging to the state during the previous administration, more especially to clear the air on the authenticity of the accumulative liabilities allegedly inherited from Turaki's government.

We are loyal to Yar'adua – Military

The Defence Headquarters in an attempt to clear its name has restated absolute loyalty of the military authorities to President Umar Musa Yar'adua. This statement came in as a rejoinder issued and signed by the Director of Defence Information, Colonel MD Yusuf debunking allegations in one of the country's newspapers which described the relationship between the Nigerian Armed Forces and President Yar'adua as frosty. Defence headquarters described the story as fabricated, malicious and concocted to create disaffection and sense of apprehension in the polity.

Fake drugs: NAFDAC reopens Onitsha drug market

Traders at the Onitsha Bridge Head Market (Onitsha drug market), who were out of business for four months following the closure by National Agency for Food Drug Administration and Control (NAFDAC), could not hold their joy as the agency re-opened the market conditionally. Onitsha Bridge Head Market was closed on March 6, 2007 over fake and counterfeit drugs. After screening of the market, NAFDAC removed and publicly destroyed 104 truckloads of fake, counterfeit, expired, banned and smuggled drugs worth over N6.5 billion from the market.

The re-opening of the market, Akunyili said became necessary following the commitment of the state governor, Mr. Obi, who she said had, on getting the Supreme Court judgment that reinstated him, called her and pleaded to fulfill every condition that would get the market reopened. The NAFDAC boss, however, gave the agency immediate and long terms conditions for the reopening of the market.

Controversy as Alao-Akala removes Oyo Chief Judge

The governor of Oyo state, Adebayo Alao-Akala, removed the state's acting Chief Judge, Justice Olagoke Ige and appointed Justice Afolabi Adeniran as a replacement. The governor's action has sent tongues

wagging. Justice Ige had been reported to have come under immense pressure from Alao-Akala to facilitate the quashing of the governor's indictment on corruption charges by the immediate past administration which it was reported that he (Justice Olagoke Ige) had refused to quash.

By the appointment on March 19, 2007, Ige could be in office for three months. But under Ige, Alao-Akala has so far not succeeded in the bid to quash his indictment by an administrative panel of inquiry. The indictment is one of the weapons being used by Alao-Akala's opponents seeking to void his election as governor. In the meantime, the state Nigeria Bar Association (NBA) has ordered its members to boycott the acting Chief Judge's Court (Justice Afolabi Adeniran).

Meanwhile, Alao-Akala's media aide, Mr. Dotun Oyelade in a defence said Ige was sacked because his re-appointment as ACJ by Ladoja on March 19, this year was not backed by a formal letter from the National Judicial Council (NJC).

AC lawmakers absent at Ekiti Assembly's maiden session

There appears to be no end yet to the political crisis rocking Ekiti Assembly as only 13 of the lawmakers attended the inaugural sitting of the House. The crisis was caused by the election of the Speaker of the House. This, however, was against the spirit of Section 91 of the 1999 Constitution, which stipulates that no fewer than 24 members shall be present at the inaugural sitting of the Assembly.

The Assembly is composed of 26 members with both the Action Congress (AC) and Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) having 13 members each. Efforts by the Assembly to elect its Speaker on at its maiden session resulted into a pandemonium, which forced the House to adjourn sine die. But another attempt by the Assembly to hold its inaugural sitting was boycotted by the AC members condemning the standing order put in place by the former Assembly, which stipulated that the ruling party shall nominate the Speaker and Deputy Speaker.

Assume position immediately Yar'Adua tells Chiefs

President Umaru Yar'Adua recently gave a directive to the new Chief of Army Staff, Lt. Gen. Luka Yusuf, to immediately assume his position. The President also directed that the immediate past Chief of Defence Staff, Gen. Martin Luther Agwai, concludes handing-over to his successor, Gen. Andrew Azazi, by Monday June 11, 2007. Yar'Adua

gave this directive after decorating Azazi and Yusuf with their new ranks at a brief ceremony held in the Council Chambers of the State House.

Azazi was promoted from a Lt. Gen. to a full General on account of his new appointment as the Chief of Defence Staff, while Yusuf, who was previously a Major General, was promoted to a Lt. Gen. after succeeding Azazi as the Chief of Army Staff.

Reps to share N6.37bn for housing, furniture, cars

Members of the House of Representatives are to share N6,372bn for their housing, vehicle and furniture allowances for the first legislative year. Each member will be paid N17.7m for his or her relocation to Abuja.

A breakdown of the package showed that each lawmaker will receive N7.9m for vehicle allowance, N5.9m for furniture and N3.9m for house rent. These perks, however, exclude official remuneration and other allowances for running their offices.

Mark's election as Senate President, a tragedy –Sagay

A former Dean of Law, University of Benin, Prof. Itse Sagay has described the emergence of Senator David Mark as President of the Senate as a tragedy. Sagay, said he had no objection to the emergence of Mrs. Olubunmi Etteh as the Speaker of the House of Representatives as, 'She has paid her dues, being a three-time member of the lower chamber.' He said a woman could perform as good as a man anytime, adding, 'I am happy that we have our first female speaker.'

Sagay who is also a Senior Advocate of Nigeria, says Mark has a bad record; he was the one who threatened to deport non-indigenes when he was the governor of Niger State. "As Minister of Communications, he said telephones were not meant for the poor. It is an eternal shame to him that virtually everybody now has a phone." Sagay said Mark had no compassion for the common man.

US to assist Nigeria on electoral reforms

The United States Government has expressed its readiness to assist the Federal Government in carrying out electoral reforms. US Ambassador to Nigeria, John Campbell, said at a press briefing

recently held in Abuja that President George Bush was prepared to step up aids and other collaboration with Nigeria.

Dariye and Nnamani: Guests at EFCC

It was like a script written and directed in Nollywood as the immediate past Governor of Plateau State, Chief Joshua Dariye, recently emerged from hiding and showed up at the office of the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission. His arrival at the Abuja office of the EFCC coincided with the assumption of office by the former Enugu State, governor, Dr. Chimaroke Nnamani, who is also indicted at the Senate.

The Chairman of the EFCC, Mallam Nuhu Ribadu, had in 2006 accused Dariye of "conspiracy, abuse of office, money laundering and diversion of public funds to the tune of N1,161,162,900."The London Metropolitan Police had also alleged that Dariye looted about £8m.

Dariye, who was on November 13, 2006 declared wanted by the EFCC, was among the immediate past governors invited some weeks ago by the EFCC to defend themselves against allegations of corruption. On May 29, he was absent at the inauguration of his successor, Mr. Jonah Jang. The commission had threatened that it would declare any former governor who failed to honour its invitation wanted. It also said that those who had fled the country would be extradited. It was learnt that the threats forced Dariye to come out of hiding.

On his part, Nnamani, said that he was not on the run. Nnamani, who was also invited by the EFCC, was at the Senate to take part in the ongoing documentation exercise for senators. The former governor, who was accompanied by some aides, said, "The most important thing is that I am here. "I am one of many governors who left office. I am one of the many governors who do have issues with the EFCC. I am one of the many governors who are in the Senate. I believe that is the story, gentlemen."

ON THE INTERNATIONAL SCENE:

William Jefferson indicted over bribery of Nigerian official -FBI

United States Democratic Representative, William Jefferson, was recently indicted on 16 criminal counts including soliciting bribes and paying off a Nigerian official, a US Justice Department official said. The lengthy 94-page indictment also charges Jefferson with racketeering,

soliciting bribes for his family, fraud, money laundering, obstruction of justice, conspiracy and violation of the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, the official said. Jefferson, who has denied any wrongdoing, faces a maximum of 235 years in prison if convicted.

Blair out, Brown in as British Prime Minister

After 10 years as British Prime Minister, Tony Blair has handed over the seat of power to his long-time neighbour, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, Gordon Brown. Brown had had to be content with being "the man who would one day become king," after a gentleman's agreement was widely speculated to have been reached between him and Blair in Islington, North London, before he allowed the former prime minister to become party leader over a decade ago.

It had, however, been a long wait for Brown, who was unveiled as the Labour Party's leader and by default, the Prime Minister in waiting recently during its special conference in Manchester.

Brown, a 56-year-old Scot known for his often-stern demeanour, beamed as he was applauded by Treasury staff before heading with his wife, Sarah, to the palace. It was indeed a short walk for Brown, who only moved from his former official home, 11, Downing Street, to the Prime Minister's official home, on No.10.

Nigerians protest killing of citizen by Spanish Police

Nigerians across the globe has been called upon by a group called Concerned Nigerians Worldwide (CNW) to demand a probe into the maltreatment and subsequent killing of a Nigerian, Osamuyia Aikpitanhi, by Spanish law enforcement agencies on June 9, this year.

According to reports, Aikpitanhi, a Nigerian immigrant, was arrested by Spanish agents and "loaded" into an Iberia aircraft bound for Lagos, Nigeria. The operatives beat the Nigerian, bound his hands and legs firmly with ropes, and put a gag over his mouth, which resulted in the death of the man". The protests will take place at Spanish Embassies worldwide, including those in the United Kingdom (UK), United States of America (USA), France, Germany, Spain, Brazil and Nigeria.

Taylor stalls war crimes trial again

Judges delayed Charles Taylor's trial on charges of directing atrocities in Sierra Leone recently after the former Liberian president failed to

show up in court, saying he lacked funds for a defence. Taylor, who is charged with instigating murder, rape and mutilation during Sierra Leone's civil war in a quest for the country's diamonds, boycotted the start of his trial in June. He sacked his lawyer and declared the trial would not be fair, adding in a letter he intended to defend himself.

Judge Julia Sebutinde expressed frustration not only with Taylor but with officials of the U.N.-backed special tribunal for Sierra Leone. Saying; "The accused does not have the option to appear before this court as and when he chooses," Judge Sebutinde said. But she added that adequate resources must be provided in the interest of a fair trial and ordered the court to ensure Taylor had another four people boosting his defence team, including a lead counsel, by July 31.

Meanwhile, Taylor has pleaded not guilty to 11 counts charge war crimes and crimes against humanity, connected with the 1991-2002 civil war which killed an estimated 50,000 people.

...A Glance At The Electoral Tribunals

Edo: Police arrest youths booing deputy governor at tribunal

It was a rough time for Edo State Deputy Governor, Mr. Lucky Imasuen, at the venue of the ongoing Election Petitions Tribunal, as angry youths booed him immediately he left the venue, though men of the police Special Anti-Robbery Squad (SARS) raided the area and arrested some youths within the court premises. The incident nearly marred the take-off of the legal battle between the former President of the Nigeria Labour Congress (NLC) and governorship candidate of Action Congress (AC), Mr. Adams Oshiomhole, and Governor Oserheimen Aigberadion Osunbor of the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP). Echoes of gunshots fired by the policemen reverberated while the court proceedings were on. Witnesses said some youths were shot while others were arrested around the court premises.

Lagos: Aregbesola accuses INEC of hiding polls' documents

Legal team of the Osun State governorship candidate of the Action Congress (AC), Rauf Aregbesola, recently alleged that the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) was intentionally withholding some sensitive materials from inspection.

The legal team, headed by Ajibola Basiru in Osogbo, the state capital said that the state INEC was poised to take them through a tele-guided inspection that may eventually make the exercise fruitless. Aregbesola had gone to the election petition tribunal challenging the election of the incumbent Governor Olagunsoye Oyinlola in the April 14 polls. Basiru stated that the materials not yet made available for the inspection team was form EC 25 A which contains the distribution of the polling materials.

Akwa Ibom: Court restrains Clerk of Senate from swearing-in Senator Effiong Bob

A Federal High Court recently gave an order restraining the Clerk of the Senate from swearing-in Senator Effiong Bob as the senator representing Akwa-Ibom North East in the Senate. A rival People's Democratic Party (PDP) chief says he is the legitimate candidate for the party, and Effiong Bob should not have been allowed to stand. Justice Binta Murtala Nyako also gave another order restraining the Independent National Electoral Commission [INEC], from handing over the certificate of return in respect of the election into Akwa-Ibom North East Senatorial seat to Senator Effiong Bob.

The court has ordered all the parties in the suit to maintain the status quo pending the hearing and determination of the suit. A court had ruled in favour of Chief Albert Akpan three days before the April Senatorial election, Akpan's counsel, Solomon Umoh, informed.

The Politics of Ribadu
